This rhythmic, read-aloud title is a celebration of the way boys feel when they leave the barber's chair.</p> |
|  | <p><i>A Long Pitch Home</i> by Natalie Dias Lorenzi Ten-year-old Bilal liked his life back home in Pakistan. He was a star on his cricket team. But when his father suddenly sends the family to live with their aunt and uncle in America, nothing is familiar.</p> |  | <p><i>The Mystery of the Stolen Statue</i> by George Stanley The Third-Grade Detectives are looking forward to their field trip to a local art museum, where a priceless fifteenth-century statue of Joan of Arc is on loan from a Paris museum. But they soon discover the statue has been stolen.</p> |
|  | <p><i>The Name Jar</i> by Yangsook Choi Being the new kid in school is hard enough, but what about when nobody can pronounce your name? Having just moved from Korea, Unhei is anxious about American kids liking her. So instead of introducing herself on the first day of school, she tells the class that she will choose a name by the following week.</p> |  | <p><i>The Rooster Who Would Not Be Quiet!</i> by Carmen Agra Deedy. La Paz is a happy, but noisy village. A little peace and quiet would make it just right. So the villagers elect the bossy Don Pepe as their mayor. Before long, singing of any kind is outlawed. They protested the unfair laws that targeted black people.</p> |
|  | <p><i>Nelson Mandela</i> by Kadir Nelson This biography tells the story of Mandela, a global icon. It is the story of a young boy's determination to change South Africa, and of the struggles of a man who eventually became the president of his country.</p> |  | <p><i>Soldier Song: A True Story of the Civil War</i> by Debbie Levy. Interwoven with soldiers' letters and journal entries, this is a true story of duty and heartbreak, loyalty and enemies, and the uniting power of music.</p> |





